The death on Sunday following a fall in his garden. some weeks ago, of Mr Harry Shilham aged 86 and a retired gardener, at 14 Spillmans Rd, Rodborough was investigated by Mr Herbert H? (divisional coroner) on Monday at Stroud Police station.

The widow, Mrs Emma Shilham told the coroner that on May 29th last her husband was walking in his garden when he fell down. She went to his assistance and with the help of a neighbour got him on his feet. He did not say what had caused him to fall, but she thought he must have stumbled over a stone. Her husband managed to get indoors alright and he continued to walk about. He made no complaints. On the following day, his neck was rather stiff and she also thought he had bruised his leg. He was not able to get about as well as previously.

Complained of giddiness

Dr Royal saw him on June 1st and told her that her husband had broken his left femur. Since that day and up to the time of his death on Saturday, he had remained in bed. He had enjoyed good health and was able to get about unaided before the accident. He was inclined to be a little clumsy in the garden and on different times had fallen. Dr Royal said he first saw Mr Shilham in 1939 When he complained of giddiness. He attended him on June 4th when he concluded that he had fractured the neck of his left femur and he (Dr Royal) gave a gloomy prognosis. Mr Shilham had made a fair recovery and when he last saw him alive on July 10th, he appeared to be progressing fairly well. His general state of health, apart from giddiness, was pretty good. In his opinion, the cause of death was myocardial degeneration due to old age and accelerated by a fractured femur.

In recording a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, the coroner said the fall might have followed an attack of giddiness or Mr Shilham might possibly have stumbled over a stone. He expressed sympathy with the widow.

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The Funeral

The funeral took place at Rodborough Church on Wednesday, the service being conducted by the Rev R Robinson of John Street Baptist Church, Stroud, of which deceased was a member.
