His case was deferred but he eventually enlisted, returning to the family business after the war. John Sandling senior died in January 1917.

Lance Corporal Sammy Sandling had a very sad home coming on leave to attend his father's funeral... his father recently died at Dudbridge. Of course, Sammy like his father is a very well- known basket maker, not a very common profession at present. He went out with the 1st Glosters and broke his ankle jumping some obstacle while chasing the Huns. Now completely recovered and ding light duties at Horfield barracks and welcoming the local lads as they join up. Sammy was always a chap for a scrap, so it is no wonder that he is anxious to get back to France again to finish the job.

In August 1918, he legally joined the Navy and the Stroud News wished him good luck "despite the turmoil he caused in this office by his patriotic fervour"!
